## Naloxone Distribution & Education Project

Dilico secured funding to procure Naloxone kits for distribution in First Nation communities. Several Mental Health & Addiction staff hosted a Harm Reduction education series within the Robinson Superior affiliated communities. The sessions included a presentation on Harm Reduction focusing on the dangers of the current toxic substance supply and where to seek assistance. Naloxone kits were distributed during the sessions. More sessions are scheduled throughout the Fall and winter.



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# Red Dress Creation Story

In the Spring of 2023, the Spirit of the red dress came to visit a Dilico worker who guides anti-violence practices for the agency, including human trafficking. The vision came through when a young Indigenous youth wore a red dress and white leather tassels that flowed with silver beads. The young woman wore strawberry beaded earrings, a necklace, a silver and turquoise belt, and white leather moccasins with strawberry accents. During this visit, she carried a small white leather purse where the young woman grabbed medicine from and approached the worker, placed the tobacco in her palm, where the young woman smiled with a nod, then walked away gracefully. The worker knew this was a message from Spirit and approached the Elder for guidance.

The worker attended the ceremony and soon learned that Spirit gave her responsibility for the creation and bringing life to the dress. While this task may sound straightforward, the worker attended ceremonies to honour and feed the Spirit of the dress and seek guidance on the creation and delivery of the red dress. The red dress symbolizes a young woman, an Indigenous female youth, who represents Indigenous girls and youth who have been murdered or are missing. The dress carries a powerful presence. The dress reflects the power and strength to honour those taken by violence. The red dress remembers and honours those spirits, bringing voice to the voiceless.

The worker was guided in a ceremony to understand that her responsibility was the creation and not to carry the dress as part of her bundle. The Spirit explained that the red dress's care, responsibility, and advocacy will be gifted and honoured to another Anishinaabe Kwe within the agency. Spirit further explained that it is the workers' role to ignite learning through honouring ways for our people. This is how we always learned as Anishinaabek people; as such, passing the red dress will encourage our ways of learning at the agency. The worker was told she will know who to honour the dress within time. The dress was birthed on July 28, 2023, and gifted to Evelyn Pelletier as the carrier. Recognizing Evelyn's lifelong dedication to advocacy for the safety and well-being of Anishinaabe children and families, whom red dress chooses as a carrier. Forthcoming, the red dress will be prepared for a naming ceremony to give her a name and teachings moving forward. Currently, the red dress is integrated into Dilico Anishinabek Family Care's ceremonies, trainings, events, and honouring those taken by violence. When passersby see the red dress, they are intrigued by the imagery. When individuals came closer to investigate, they could read about the creation story of the red dress and learn about the crisis of violence against Indigenous women and girls in Canada with the correlation of the child welfare system and human trafficking.

# Midwifery Program

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Dilico Anishinabek Family Care's Midwifery team consists of three midwives; Lisa Bishop, Amy Pelletier, and Suzanne Fitzpatrick, one social worker, and one program assistant who provide specialized Midwifery care to Indigenous Women and their families in a holistic and culturally safe way. The team travels out to the Robinson Superior communities to meet with expecting mothers and follow their perinatal (pre-birth, birth, and post-birth) journeys. In 2019 we acquired the ability to apprentice our first Indigenous Midwife. Suzanne Fitzpatrick began her apprenticeship which she successfully completed in January 2022, we are very proud of Suzanne and her accomplishments!

The Dilico Midwifery team understands firsthand the daily struggles of Indigenous Women and families and aims to alleviate that burden by learning and incorporating traditional teachings and culturally safe care. The team continues to work closely with our Dilico teams and partners to ensure gaps are filled and service needs are met. The team has had great success thus far and we look forward to enhancing that success for the years to come. The goal of the Dilico Midwifery team is to have an Anishinabe name, which will be honoured at a special ceremony.

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# Fully funded Personal Support Worker training

Dilico in partnership with Saint Elizabeth Health are offering for the third year a fully funded Personal Support Worker Training Program. The program includes in-person seminars, online modules, clinical training, and clinical placements. All students will have cultural, and program supports as needed throughout the program. Tuition, books, supplies, travel, meals, and accommodation will be covered for all students. Graduates will receive a Personal Support Worker Certificate from Saint Elizabeth Health.

Admission requirements for this course are:

- Grade 12 Secondary School Diploma or a General Educational Development (GED Certificate) or be of Mature Student Status.
- Must be 18 years of age or older.
